KCRHA Updates

Peter Lynn - KCRHA

- KCRHA is currently working on the Continuum of Care NOFO. There will be a presentation later on where we're at, with that the subcommittee has been very busy. Two new funding sources for bonus money and a third for the Special NOFO (SNOFO).
- KCRHA is in the second half of our contract year. This is the initial startup contract year, we took 330 contracts from the City and King County and consolidated those contracts down to 215 contracts. We have 55 providers that we are working with on those contracts. As this is the RHA's implementation year we have stood those contracts up, currently invoicing, we are moving those

forward and then we are in the budgeting process for 2023, we have made our recommendations and asked for additional funding and are actively pursuing additional sources of revenue.

- RHA is currently in active conversations with The State Department of Commerce who has
 released some funding to address issues with regard to right of way, for folks living on rights of
 way. RHA applied for and successfully received just under \$14M for this year 2022 and RHA has
 applied for additional funding for next year.
- As RHA continues to seek additional dollars for the region and expansion of the opportunities going up to Federal dollars, State dollars and have requested additional funding on the local level.
- Emergency Housing Vouchers It was just over a year ago, RHA sent out agreements to 80 different providers, half were new to The Authority and did not have contracts, in the end we signed up 77 non profits, 3 municipalities and one tribal nation as referring agencies for that program. We are the most successful Emergency Voucher Programs in the Nation.
 - Looking at the national average, our current rate of people housed is 76% with those vouchers.
 - King County 81% Leased
 - Seattle 72% Leased
 - Renton 30% Leased
- There is a new program that's aligned with the Special NOFO that's due in October The Stability Program that will be released to the public, though not as many of these vouchers as the EHV vouchers. Committee members ask to invite The Public Housing Agency partners to come and present the goals for those and their voucher program especially around the stability voucher program.
 - How do the Stability Vouchers and what is the value of them being used in Permanent Supportive Housing
 - Project-Based Vouchers?? Understanding what the program is.
 - Motion to form a Sub-committee that will actually work at engagement with providers and folks in the community within the evaluating lens of racial equity and actual performance in community. Moved by Karen Taylor, Second by Kristina Sawyckyj. Motion Passed unanimously by the Advisory Committee Members.
- Housing Command Center Unified Command Center (UCC) In partnership with Partnership for Zero. UCC main work is to
 - Accurately identify folks needing housing and
 - Building up resources/pools for housing
 - Connecting the two.

- Tier 1 is equal to 95% of the CoC's Annual Renewal Demand (ARD)
 Does not include YHDP projects
- Tier 2 is the difference between Tier 1 and the maximum amount of renewal, reallocation and CoC/DV Bonus funds that a CoC can apply for.

*ARD changed 9/1, which impacted Tier 1 and bonus amounts than we initially had published.

• Rating and Ranking

- **Rating** Scoring projects based on standard criteria (ex: Rapid Re-housing; how many days it takes to move-in to housing after entering a program).
- **Ranking** Prioritizing projects based on our local CoC prioritizes (ex: historically youth programs have rated low because we wanted to prioritize ending youth homelessness we ranked lower scoring programs higher to not risk de-funding all youth programs).

• Our Raters - We had Five (5)

- Chosen for their expertise and lived experience.
- All raters attended an RFP rater orientation which included an implicit bias component.
- Rater's were given scoring rubrics and criteria to help maintain scoring consistency and objectivity.
 - Rating and Ranking Process Five Raters reviewed from August 25 -September2
 - 47 Renewal Applications (6 are not rated)
 - 7 PSH (Permanent Supportive Housing) CoC Applications
 - 3 DV Bonus Applications
 - Met for 4+ hours on September 1st and 2nd
 - Joined Subcommittee meeting on September 2 for final ranking
- Rating and Ranking Final Recommendations
- <u>Tier 1</u>
 - 41 Projects with 1 project straddling Tier 1 and Tier 2 due to funding
 - Had to move more Tier 1 Projects into Tier 2 due to Tier 1 amount.
 - Moves based on final overall score with 2 exceptions:
 - Kept PSH project in Tier 1
 - Kept Youth TH project in Tier 1 as to not risk funding more more youth programs
 - All unrated programs in Tier 1 due to risk of defunding
 - **Except** YHDP Behavioral Health followed tiering for 2021 and placed in Tier 2.
- <u>Tier 2</u>
 - 12.5 Projects in Tier 2
 - Decisions led by overall score
 - Review System Priorities notably Equity and Housing First narratives to determine whether to move a project into Tier 1.
 - Tiering amounts led to more in Tier 2 than planned
- Rating and Ranking CoC Bonus Projects

 - FOY Francis Village Permanent Supportive Housing

 - All approved for funding
 - API Chaya and YWCA for RRH
 - Will apply as one grand with 2 subrecipients
 - GEGBV-SSO-CE > expansion for current CE for DV System
