Co-Chair Election:

As per the Charter we are able to elect two co-chairs to serve the board. For the election of the Co-Chairs we will hold two different votes, one for Co-Chair Position A and one for Co-Chair Position B. There is no difference in powers awarded to these positions. Nominations do require a second, you may nominate yourself, and you may run in both Elections [But you can not hold both seats]. If you are a nominee you may still vote in your election. As per the Charter a majority is established by 60% of the voting members. As a reminder abstention will lower the threshold needed for the 60% as that is essentially not voting either way while you are present, it is highly encouraged to keep your vote to a YEA or a NAY. With that said we are now opening nominations.

\$62,592,160	\$53,300,251	\$7,511,059	\$2,644,768	\$1,500,000

- Tier 1 is equal to 90 percent of the CoC's Annual Renewal Demand (ARD)
 - Does not include YHDP projects.
- Tier 2 is the difference between Tier 1 and the maximum amount of renewal, reallocation, and CoC/DV Bonus funds that a CoC can apply for.



Rating v. Ranking

- **Rating**: scoring projects based on standard criteria (for example, for rapid rehousing how many days it takes to move-in to housing after entering the program).
- **Ranking**: prioritizing projects based on our local CoC prioritizes (for example, historically youth programs have rated low - because we wanted to prioritize ending youth homelessness we ranked lower scoring programs higher to not risk de-funding all youth programs).



Our Raters

- **14 Raters**

- Raters were chosen for their expertise and lived experience
- Raters attended/reviewed 2-day RFP rater orientation which included an implicit bias component and how to evaluate the applications
- Raters were given scoring rubrics and criteria to help maintain scoring consistency and objectivity.
- Over 5 hours of debriefing and reviewing rating/ranking decisions.

New vs. Renewal

- NEW: A project that does not have current CoC funding *or* a project seeking additional CoC funds to expand.
 - More detailed criteria and review was required for NEW projects.
 - Reviewed for Program Type eligibility based on HUD guidelines
- RENEWAL: Currently funded CoC projects
 - Application scores are combined with HMIS data-driven scores.



Eligible Program Types

- Permanent Supportive Housing
- Rapid Rehousing
- Joint Component Transitional Housing-Rapid Rehousing
- Supportive Services – Coordinated Entry
- HMIS



Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

- Permanent housing in which housing assistance (e.g., long-term leasing or rental assistance) and supportive services are provided to assist households with at least one member (adult or child) with a disability in achieving housing stability.
- Eligible participants must be experiencing chronic homelessness*



Rapid Rehousing

- RRH is permanent housing that provides short-term (up to three months) and medium-term (4-24 months) tenant-based rental assistance and supportive services to households experiencing homelessness.
- RRH programs **must offer participants supportive services** to help them achieve long-term housing stability.
 - **Program participants are required to meet with a case manager at least once a month** and should have access to a broad array of additional services to help them maintain housing.



Joint Component TH-RRH

- A new type of project that **combines the activities of a transitional housing project with those of a rapid re-housing project.**
- These projects provide a safe place for people to stay – transitional housing – with financial assistance and wrap around supportive services determined by program participants to help them move to permanent housing as quickly as possible.



Supportive Services Only - CE

- Recipients may provide supportive services—such as **conducting outreach to sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons and families** and providing **referrals to other housing or other necessary services**—to families and individuals experiencing homelessness.
- The recipient may only assist program participants for whom the recipient or subrecipient of the funds is not providing housing or housing assistance.



Homelessness Management Information System (HMIS)

- The HMIS program component allows HMIS Lead Entities to operate the HMIS, which includes leasing a structure in which the HMIS operates, purchasing or leasing computer hardware, software and/or leasing equipment, operating the structure in which the HMIS is housed, and covering other costs related to establishing, operating, and customizing a CoC's HMIS.



Rating & Ranking - Final Recommendations

- **Tier 1:**

- 43 projects with 1 project straddling Tier 1 and Tier 2 due to dollar amount in Tier 1.
- We see more projects Tier 2 due to Tier 1 amount in FY24.
- Unrated programs:
 - Required projects in Tier 1 due to risk of defunding
 - New projects renewing without enough data or later project start placed below lowest rated of the same program type.

- **Tier 2:**

- 11 projects in Tier 2 (1 straddling)
 - Decisions led by overall score



Rating & Ranking - CoC Bonus

- CoC Bonus:
 - 10 projects applied for funding

- 8 Projects met threshold for funding and were fully funded based on available bonus amount (3 projects will be applied for as one).

- IPVE Bonus:
 - 5 projects applied for funding

- 4 projects met threshold for funding and were selected based on available bonus amount.



Final Overview

- 56 Projects are renewing
- 6 new projects with the CoC Bonus
- 4 new projects with the IVPE Bonus
- Total request from HUD: **\$74,247,987**

I. Summary

This memo is to share information about a Continuum of Care (CoC) Builds (CoCBUILDS) NOFO. This NOFO adds new units of permanent supportive housing (PSH) through new construction, acquisition, or rehabilitation through one-time CoCBUILDS awards under the CoC Program. Through the CoCBUILDS NOFO, HUD is encouraging CoCs to leverage funds provided for construction, acquisition, or rehabilitation of new PSH units with other funding sources to maximize the amount of housing that can be directed to meeting the needs of individuals and families experiencing homelessness.

II. Background

- CoC Builds NOFO is capital-focused, allowing for a single project
- CoC Builds will be a highly competitive NOFO and has clear priorities.
- HUD priorities will be used as a threshold review for applications proposing to provide PSH to determine the most competitive CoC Builds project.
- The maximum for grant funding is \$10 million dollars for the general CoCBUILDS grant.
- Additional funds are available to a Continuum that includes an eligible project on Tribal land,
 - King County is currently working with the Muckleshoot Tribe on an eligible project. This will require:
 - The CoC adding the tribal lands to the CoC geography for this project
 - The maximum funding for the eligible Tribal project is \$2 million dollars.

III. NOFO Process and Next Steps

- A team, including King County and KCRHA Procurement is meeting regularly to develop the grant application.
- King County Housing Finance Program (HFP) and City of Seattle Office of Housing (OH), coordinating with other local, state, and federal programs are the core capital funders for Permanent Supportive Housing in King County. They maintain contracts for the 50-year use requirements associated with funding awards.
- King County will be the applicant as a highly experienced capital funder and manager of federal PSH operations contracts. These are scoring elements in HUD's NOFO.
- King County HFP and City of Seattle OH implement annual procurement processes. As part of this process, they collect information needed for the NOFO about proposed projects including budget, timeline and population(s) to be served.
- King County with KCRHA will write the grant application.
- One question in the grant asks for HMIS data regarding PSH availability. KCRHA CI team is working to provide data for this question.
- The grant application must include a letter of support from the CoC Board.
- The letter of support will be presented to the CoC Board at their November meeting for their signature.
- KCRHA, as the CoC lead, will submit the grant in Grants.Gov
- Grant Deadline Date: November 21, 2024
